As the leaves begin to change colour and the Wildlife Rescue team bids farewell to the final broods of babies raised in our care for the season, it is also time to prepare for our cold weather operations and the new challenges the cooler season brings. But first, we want to take a moment to reflect upon the lifesaving work your support has made possible this summer.

Over June, July, and August, Wildlife Rescue's Helpline received 14,640 calls— an average of 159 calls every day from compassionate and proactive members of the public like yourself.

With our Summer Admissions and Triage location established early to support shorter wait times and quicker treatment this busy season, 2,326 animals received immediate care when they needed it most.

We expect this fall to be our busiest yet and we're preparing by stocking up on equipment and resources such as heat pads, medication, and specialized diets. Consider becoming a monthly freedom partner today and ensure these essential resources are stocked all year round!

As more and more wildlife patients come through our doors each day, we are grateful that we can respond to every case with the highest level of emergency and rehabilitative care thanks to your support.

A FAMILY IN NEED

If you're a birdwatcher at Burnaby Lake, you're likely well acquainted with the family of Sandhill Cranes that make their home in the reedy shallows. These majestic birds are a popular sight and bring joy and wonder to hundreds of park-goers each day. Earlier this year, the pair of cranes raised a colt, making the family even more popular.

In June, Wildlife Rescue was alerted by vigilant members of the public that the cranes had been coughing and exhibiting other worrisome symptoms of illness. Our team of experts' assessment determined that parasites were the most likely cause of the cranes' illness.

After confirmation from the medical teams observational assessment, Wildlife Rescue

enacted a plan to provide treatment without removing the cranes from their home. Wildlife Rescue's plan was to administer two safe doses of anti-parasitic medication over a period of two weeks, though this plan was not without its challenges!

For the first dose the team arrived early in the morning in the hope that the quiet atmosphere would help us make the most of a stressful situation, but the cranes were shy and kept their distance. However, upon returning to the site in the evening we were able to provide the first dose of medication by using a food source.

With help from the public, we continued to monitor the cranes' health and the first treatment showed signs of improving their

condition. Wildlife Rescue returned in the evening two weeks later to provide a second dose.

The family appeared to be doing well and were more receptive to our team. The mother crane was diligent in feeding the baby and fed the colt the bait dosed with the medication. The father was more elusive, but upon a return visit to the park the following morning, all members of the family had received the safe and often effective treatment.

Committed field teams continued to monitor the family daily, but it became clear that though the health of the cranes was improving, a third dose was likely necessary. By the third visit, our team was well aware of the family's habits, and the final dose was administered with relative ease.

Thank you to the members of the public who keep us in mind when observing wildlife. It's because of you that we were made aware of the health issues these beloved cranes were facing. We will continue to monitor this family, but we believe that with our help they've surmounted this challenge. With luck, these cranes and the generations to come will be around for many more years to awe and delight.


